MTM - INFRASTRUCTURE AND OPERATIONS PROGRESS

NEW OPERATION PHAKISA PORT INFRASTRUCTURE

- Transnet National Ports Authority (TNPA) and Transnet SOC Limited adopted a
 Public- Private -Partnership (PPP) model to finance new Operation Phakisa
 infrastructure at the Ports of Saldanha Bay, Richards Bay and East London:
 - R 5 billion Government investment
 - PPP opportunity of approximately R7 billion investment in new facilities;
 - Development of funding model at an advanced stage.
 - A Section 79 application granted by the Minister of Transport for a port lease at the Port of Port Elizabeth in support of the Composites Cluster and boat building, and the Manganese terminal at Coega IDZ. Unlock of R 1.25 billion in investment contracts over the next 5 years building of catamarans, creating approximately 500 jobs.



MTM - INFRASTRUCTURE AND OPERATIONS PROGRESS

NEW OPERATION PHAKISA PORT INFRASTRUCTURE

• Establishment of Saldanha Bay as an oil and gas hub: Total investment (public and private) estimated at R9.2 billion - 3 projects: Offshore Supply Base (work has commenced, approximately 30 initial jobs currently being created); Berth 205 (construction of new rig repair facility); Mossgas Jetty (extension of existing quay).



MAINTENANCE AND REFURBISHMENT OF EXISTING FACILITIES

- Transnet National Ports Authority (TNPA) and Transnet SOC Limited will fund and execute
 the refurbishment and upgrade of existing Ship Repair Facilities at South African
 commercial ports.
- Government investment: R 2 billion
- Scope of works completed for all projects;
- Projects at various different stages of planning and execution.
- Highlights include:



DURBAN: Refurbishment of outer dry dock caisson and procurement of equipment; **SALDANHA BAY:** Upgrade of Offshore Supply Base in execution phase.

A total of 177 construction related jobs have been created within the last 12 months.





MTM - SKILLS AND CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRESS

- Department of Labour through the Employment Services of South Africa (ESSA) initiated the Workplace Based Learning Programme (WBL).
- Workplace Based Learning Programme (WBL) policy framework drafted to support the proposed Workplace Based Learning Programme Agreement Regulations for the placement of 2550 TVET College Graduates.
- A specific Marine Transport and Manufacturing (MTM) recruitment project will be developed using the Employment Services of South Africa (ESSA) system. Skills Working Groups are in the process of finalising the profiling and selection process.
- The amendment of Seafarers Bill approved by Parliament to fast track skills development within the marine sector.





MTM - SKILLS AND CAPACITY BUILDING PROGRESS

- SAIMI established to coordinate Maritime Education and Training.
- Funding secured to run the National Cadet Programme. Discussions underway on a distributive model for cadet training (utilisation of a dedicated vessel, governmental fleet and commercial fleet).
- Two colleges identified for a pilot project to produce Ratings from Jan 2017.
- Two new high schools for maritime studies were launched in 2016 the schools are Ngwenyathi S.S.S in Nxarhuni near Mdantsane, Eastern Cape and George Randell S.S.S. near East London Airport. They commenced classes in January 2016 and started with intake of Grade 10 pupils. Teachers have been trained though a refresher course in Belgium and preparation course in Western Cape.





PUBLIC PROCUREMENT

Achievements since the designation of working vessels for local procurement (60% local content) and issuance of the instruction note by National Treasury:

- 5 Tenders for new builds and 5 tenders for maintenance work advertised with the 60% local content requirement included in the RFPs by procuring entities;
- A private company is currently building 7 tugboats as part of a R1.4 billion tender awarded by TNPA in 2014:
 - The contract has to date created approximately 200 additional jobs. More than 60 apprentice artisans are in training as well as three marine engineers;
 - More than R700 million has been earmarked for the Supplier Development Plan entered into by SAS and Transnet local suppliers, employees and graduates;
 - The first of 2 new, powerful tugboats bound for the Port of Port Elizabeth port marked the first milestone in a R1.4-billion nine-tugboat contract to bolster the efficiency of the ports' marine operations countrywide.





PUBLIC PROCUREMENT

Achievements since the designation of working vessels for local procurement (60% local content) and issuance of the instruction note by National Treasury:

- Private investments of R289.9 million and R63.4 million approved under the 12l tax incentive. These investments are expected to create 141 and 214 direct jobs respectively.
- Private company granted a Section 79 to build a facility at Port Elizabeth Harbour with R1,25 bn worth of orders of exports. Expected to create 500 jobs. Lease agreement signed with TNPA in December 2015.
- Local company awarded a tender worth approximately R23million to build workboat ferries for the Navy.
- Private partnership to build two new vessels to carry out supply and support work for offshore diamond mining activities in Port Nolloth. The private investment is to the value of R150 million, creating 3000 indirect jobs.





MARKETING CAMPAIGN

 Transnet has developed strategic marketing campaign and value proposition for target markets.

SUPPORT LOCAL REGISTRY OF VESSELS

- Three ships have now been registered on the South African Ship register:
 - Two bulk carriers will be operating from Port of Port Elizabeth where the company will establish offices;
 - A third vessel, a 24 500 GT (Gross Tonnage)
 oil tanker operating from the Port of Cape Town

SUPPORT LOCAL REGISTRY OF VESSELS

- Incentives are provided to attract vessels to re-flag as South African vessels:
 - The Ports Regulator of SA has made concessions for Ships registered in terms of Chapter 4, Part 1 of the Ship Registration Act which are: 1) Built for conveyance for compensation of passengers or goods, and 2) Whether they are engaged in international or coastal trade.

The discount is applicable year on year up to 31 March 2019 as follows:


- √ Vessels registered in 2016/17 will receive a 30%
- √ Vessels registered in 2017/18 will receive a 20% discount, and
- ✓ Vessels registered in 2018/19 will receive a 10% discount.
- The amendment to the Income Tax Act, 58 of 1962 which introduced a new section 12Q, providing tax exemptions to qualifying shipping companies.

LEASES

- DPW task team first six leases signed, eight approved
- TRANSNET published a notice for comment to approve fifteen (15) year period for 8 leases (additional 85ha) in Saldanha, a big win for the aquaculture industry and for Operation Phakisa!




HIGHLIGHTS

- Total number of aquaculture Phakisa projects: 30;

ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTER-DEPARTMENTAL AUTHORISATIONS COMMITTEE

Currently, there is an uncoordinated approach to processing of applications for Aquaculture, approvals of which can take up to 830 days. The establishment of the Inter-Departmental Authorisations Committee ("IAC") aims to co-ordinate applications and approvals, with the expectation of reducing processing time to 240/360 days.



From 830 to 150/200 days (7 months)!

During Operation Phakisa Lab, EIA process for aquaculture was reduced from 360 to between 150/200 days!!

ESTABLISHMENT OF A GLOBALLY RECOGNIZED MONITORING AND CERTIFICATION SYSTEM

- DAFF and NRCS (National Regulator for Compulsory Specifications) entered into MOU
 to certify fish and fish products. SANS standards for bivalves have been finalized
 and gazetted in April 2016, an important step in order export the product;
- The <u>first</u> Aquatic Animal Health and Welfare Implementation Plan in South Africa has been approved;
- The EU conducted a fact finding mission for cultured abalone in February 2016.





ESTABLISHMENT OF AN AQUACULTURE DEVELOPMENT FUND

A Working Group has been established with relevant DFI and Departments in order to co-ordinate funding for aquaculture.

ADF aims to fast-track growth, while meeting transformation objectives






PROJECT PROGRESS

- This farm received a long term lease for the land based facility from DPW. The expansion project aims to increase the annual production to 10 million oysters per year.
- Under the stimulus of Operation Phakisa and facilitation by both DAFF and the NRCS, the company has recently been approved as an exporter to both Mainland China and Taiwan, a development which has the potential to greatly increase exports in the near future

DRAFT AQUACULTURE BILL: PUBLIC CONSULTATIONS

The Department of Agriculture, Forestry and Fisheries (DAFF) hereby invite interested and affected stakeholders to participate in the public consultations on the Draft Aquaculture Bill. The Draft Aquaculture Bill seeks to create an efficient regulatory regime for the aquaculture sector in order to create an enabling environment to promote aquaculture sector growth.

The objectives of the Aquaculture Bill are to promote responsible aquaculture development; promote the development and management of the South African aquaculture sector; promote coordination of aquaculture research and development activities; enable the aquaculture sector to be regulated more effectively, and to promote transformation of the sector.

PORT - MARINE TRANSPORT & MANUFACTURING

- Refurbishment of 1200 ton lead-in jetties
- Construction of a new slipway –associated with the upgrade of the boat hoist facility to a 90 ton facility. The new facility will provide for the repair and maintenance of 12 (twelve) vessels as compared to the current 2 (two) vessels.
- Private Company is currently in the process of building nine

 (9) tugboats as part of the tender of R1.4 billion awarded
 by Transnet National Ports Authority (TNPA) in 2014. The contract to date has created approximately 200 additional jobs. Two tugs will be based at the Port of Port Elizabeth.
- Private company granted a Section 79 to build a facility at Port Elizabeth Harbour with R1,25 bn worth of orders of exports. Expected to create 500 jobs. Lease agreement signed with TNPA in December 2015.
- Two bulk carriers, now registered on the South African Ships register and flying the SA flag, will be operating from Port of Port Elizabeth where the company will establish offices.

AQUACULTURE

- The Port of Port Elizabeth received bids for the construction of a commercial marine finfish hatchery for the grow out production of marine finfish such as kabeljou, yellowtail and Cape salmon as well as a factory for oyster processing.
- One million small abalone (spat) have been seeded in a 3 km stretch of coast in Port Elizabeth/Cape Recife (18 km had been allocated for this purpose). The community has a 35% share and the BEE security company has a 10% share – thus a 45% BEE share in this initiative.
- Aquaculture project in Port Elizabeth/Cape Recife on abalone are in production phase.



PORT of PE: REFURBISHMENT of 1200 Ton LEAD-IN JETTIES



The existing repair facility at the 1200 Lead-in jetties catered for boarepairs mainly supporting the fishing industry, as well as tug and pilc boats.

The re-built facility re-established the structural integrity of the jetties and allows for an extended life to the 1200 Ton slipway.

The new jetties has also been constructed at a lower level, creating much needed additional berthing space and creating furthe opportunities to perform wet repairs.

Work executed to refurbish this facility:

- 1. Demolishment of existing south and north Lead-in jetty structure;
- 2. Installation of new piles, concrete deck and down haul winch house building;
- 3. Installation of bollards and fenders on the mooring side of the Slipway;
- 4. Installation of high mast lights and electrical reticulation;
- 5. Installation of new Fire water piping.





















NEW BOAT HOIST FACILITY: CONSTRUCTION OF NEW 90 TON BOAT HOIST DOCKING BAY











1. BOAT MAINTENANCE AREA and DOCKING BAY for THE NEW 90 TON BOAT HOIST

- **✓** New Boat maintenance facility: COMPLETED
 - Excavation and installation of new piles to support the platform deck and docking bay;
 - Construction of a new retaining wall and backfilling behind the retaining wall to reclaim the old 40 ton slipway;
 - Constructing of a new concrete slab where at least 10 vessels can be placed for maintenance purposes;
 - Installation of bollards and fenders on the mooring side of the Slipway;
 - Installation of high mast lights and electrical reticulation;
 - Installation of new Fire water piping;
 - Commissioning of a new 90 Ton boast hoist.






